Submission to Masterton District Council Regarding Demolition of the Town Hall and Municipal Buildings

I strongly oppose the demolition of the Town Hall and Municipal Buildings, including the façade, under Resource Consent Application No RM240135. I support **Option 3: decommissioning and mothballing** the buildings until ratepayers are made aware of the future cost of the water rates under the Local Water Done Well initiative, expected to be consulted on in April. This Council should not be proposing to spend any ratepayers' money on non-essential projects until after the true cost of water rates and the subsequent rates rise percentage has been disclosed to the community. Then the community can decide if they can afford both.

There is no urgency to demolish these heritage buildings given the Government has extended the deadline to remediate earthquake-prone buildings until 2031. The Town Hall has been closed for nearly ten years and there are other conference and event venues around the Wairarapa that have filled this void. Yes, people are tired of the whole debate but that is no reason to demolish what could turn out to be a costly mistake.

Over 1000 people in this community (including most Councillors and the current Mayor) protested at the Hands around the Town Hall protest in June 2021 to retain these buildings, including the façade, but now they want to demolish it all. The Municipal Buildings are a significant cultural asset to Masterton, representing a tangible link to our town's history and identity. Given the limited heritage structures remaining in this town, preserving these buildings should be a priority, but not until the Local Water Done Well programme of works is sorted, costed, and made visible to the public.
